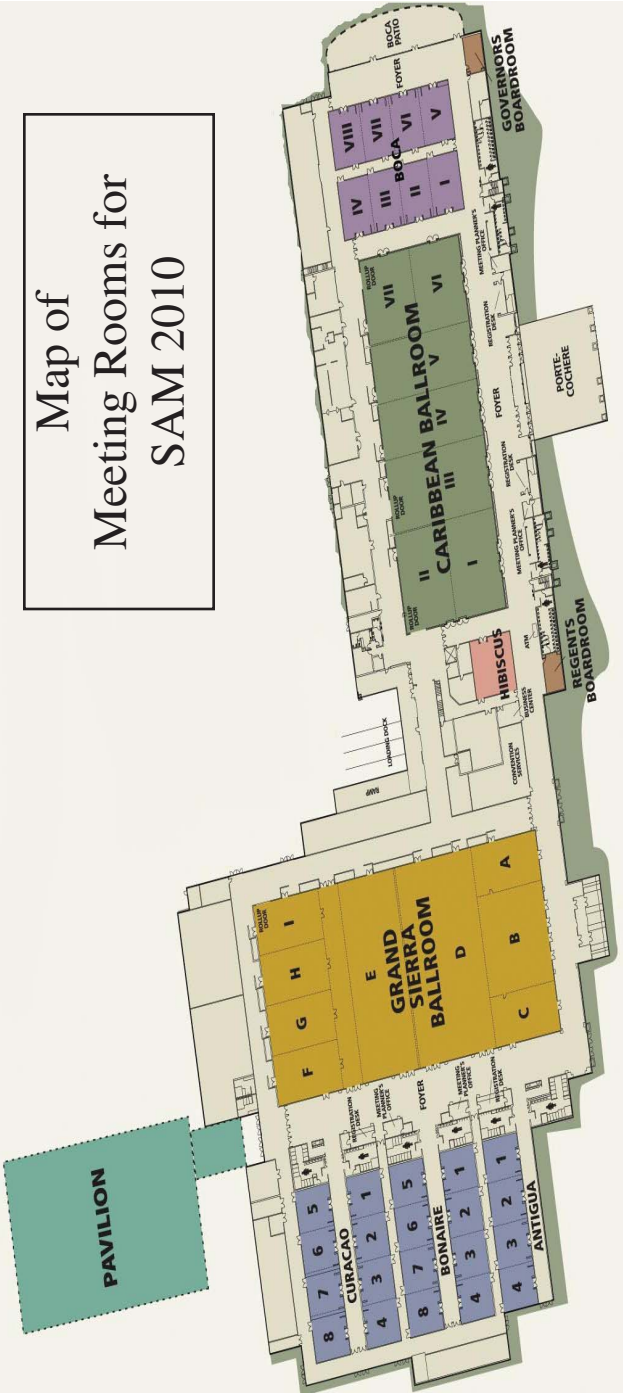

Information About Badge Scanning at SAM 2010

Every attendee in the physician program is assigned an electronic badge upon check-in. This badge will need to be scanned at the start and end of each half-day session in order to determine the exact time of attendance and assign credits accordingly. You must scan in and out of each lecture hall every time you enter and exit.

Main Lecture Hall (Grand Sierra A, B, C): A set of scanning towers is located at the entrance to this lecture hall. Attendance is tracked when you walk through the tower (every time you enter and exit the lecture hall). A light on the tower will flash every time it detects your badge. This will track your entering and exiting the lecture hall.

Daily Side Tracks: Scanning machines are located at the entrance to these lecture halls. You will need to physically touch your badge to the machine every time you enter and exit these tracks. The machine will beep and a green light will flash upon entering the lecture halls. The machine will beep and a red light will flash upon exiting the lecture halls.

A log will be posted in the registration area each day for you to review your earned hours and submit corrections, if necessary.

Total contact hours will be calculated from the electronic badges that each physician will use to enter the lecture halls. For FPMA members, those contact hours will be documented on your FPMA continuing education sheet. Certificates showing total contact hours will be mailed to non-members.

SAM attendees will be awarded up to 30.5 continuing education contact hours, depending on tracks attended.

In Florida, Practice Management hours are not required and are limited to 3.0 hours per biennium; Risk Management is limited to 1.0 hour per biennium; Laws & Rules is limited to 1.0 hour per biennium; Medical Errors is limited to 2.0 hours per biennium. Effective July 1, 2006, 1.0 hour of HIV/AIDS only has to be completed in the initial biennium of licensure and in the first renewal cycle. It is not mandatory thereafter.
